Tell me a little bit about yourself outside of WakeMed? When I am not volunteering at WakeMed I am a high school student taking full-time college classes at Wake Technical Community College. In terms of what I do in my free time, I enjoy hanging out with my friends, whether that be in person or online, and playing chess with them.

<u>What is Your Volunteer Role?</u> Carolyn is a Guest Ambassador; Thursday A.M. and Richard is a Courtesy Cart driver on Wednesdays.

Tell me a little bit about yourself outside of WakeMed? We moved here from Chicago in 2009 and love living in Cary! We have two daughters, Katie (25) and Carey (22). Richard has three grown children from a prior marriage, we also have seven grandchildren. In addition to spending time with family, we both enjoy travel, time spent with friends, reading, and walking.



<u>How long have you been volunteering at WakeMed?</u> Carolyn: I have volunteered with WakeMed since 2017. Richard: I started working as a Courtesy Cart driver in November 2022.

Why did you choose WakeMed to volunteer? Carolyn: I have spent enough time as a patient to know that hospitals can be scary places. I wanted to volunteer so I could help patients (and visitors) feel just a little less overwhelmed or stressed. Richard: Carolyn knew that WakeMed was looking for Courtesy Cart drivers and thought that I would enjoy the role, so here I am!

What attributes/skills/abilities of value have you added for our patients, families, and staff? Carolyn: I think the most important ability is the willingness to help, whether it is a patient, family or staff member. And I try to demonstrate this with a smile, listening skills, and empathy. I want to make someone feel like a person and not just a medical record number.

Richard: I like being the first "face of WakeMed" that many patients and visitors (and sometimes employees) see when they arrive in our parking lot.

What does this experience mean to you? Carolyn: I love Thursdays! I typically come home with one or more stories of interactions with patients or visitors that touched me. The re-telling of my stories makes me smile...and sometimes brings me to tears. Richard: I like knowing that what I do makes a difference. I think many people are surprised that we offer this service and are grateful for the help.

Can you describe a particular time you felt you were making a difference in the lives of others at WakeMed? Carolyn: I have been thanked a number of times for taking the time to listen to people's stories. And I have also been thanked for my smile, which is a simple thing but can make a big difference in a big, scary place like a hospital. Richard: I have transported a number of physically-challenged people from our parking garage to the front door. In many cases, they have been unable to find an available handicapped space, so I sometimes find that I am also transporting walkers, canes, and maybe even a wheelchair.

<u>Please provide a Direct Quote:</u> Carolyn: I love knowing that what I do can make a difference to people. I feel that I have been very fortunate in life, and I am grateful for the opportunity to be able to give back. Richard: I am proud that WakeMed is my neighborhood hospital, and I love being able to surprise people with a ride from their car to the front door.

Which WakeMed Tenet best describes you and why? (Tenets-Always exhibits this every-time behavior. Holds self and others accountable and positively influences others). Carolyn: Definitely respect for people. As a Guest Ambassador, I am often the first "face of WakeMed" (assuming the person has not interacted with one of our Courtesy Cart drivers!), and first impressions are huge. I think you can best influence that impression by being respectful. Richard: Definitely respect for people! The world, and certainly hospitals, can be challenging. I think we can best make a difference through respect. Thank you Carolyn and Richard! We appreciate you both!


Upcoming Volunteer Opportunities
