#### **Cary's Chair Report**



Dear Friends,

I am honored to represent WakeMed Cary as the new Volunteer Board Chair. I was "recruited" to the Board three years ago by our former, long-time beloved chairwoman the late Susan Alvey, who left me with a strong vision for the future. I believe she is sitting on my shoulder, whispering in my ear now and again to remind me of her hopes for this group! I also am stepping into huge footprints left behind by our leader of the past three years, Beth Turner. Beth did an outstanding job leading this Board and representing us throughout the Hospital system.

Her attention to detail and mastery of organization is sorely missed. My first experience with hospital volunteers was nearly 30 years ago. Diagnosed with Stage 4 cancer, I received treatment, including a year of experimental chemotherapy, at a small hospital in Florida. I was terrified most of the time and very alone. The hospital had a small group of very active volunteers – Pink Ladies – so named for their salmon colored smocks. Mostly septuagenarians, octogenarians (and older!) the Pink Ladies took me under their wings, were with me for every surgery, held my hand and often wiped my tears. I would not have made it through the ordeal without them.

Hospital volunteers have evolved over the years but our mission remains pretty much the same as those Pink Ladies of the past. Our commitment to WakeMed Cary, the patients and staff, as well as our Cary community, even throughout these difficult times of COVID, remains strong.

The number of volunteers in the hospital certainly has changed over the past two years as COVID has kept many of our men and women from entering the hospital and taking up their tasks. I am so proud that our volunteers continue to serve throughout this crisis in many other ways.

Hundreds of facemasks, made by community volunteers, were collected and distributed to hospital staff, affiliates and community charities. Throughout the COVID crisis, our Threads Committee and the community crafters have continued to create an endless number of comfort items such as quilts, afghans, baby hats, etc. to be distributed to patients.

In addition, the WakeMed Volunteer Board identified needs of overworked hospital staff members and provided a needed break with an ice cream truck with treats. Some physical relief was provided with professional chair massages for the hospital staff.

In October, our Halloween Trunk or Treat returned after a year's hiatus. Nurses, community groups, Cary Fire Department, Police, and friends of the Hospital decorated vehicles. They came out costumed in the rain and cold and passed out candy and treats to some-1000 community children. This was an overwhelming turnout and a tribute to the hard work of event-creator Lois Dziedzic and her fellow board members who helped organize and carry out this tremendously successful annual board event.

While we're still working our Adult and Junior volunteers back into hospital positions, we continue to spread good will for WakeMed Cary at community events. I so look forward to the coming year and helping to keep that angel sitting on my shoulder proud of her WakeMed Cary Board and volunteers.



Amigurumi is the Japanese word which describes **small knitted or crocheted stuffed toys**, often in the shape of characters, animals, mini foods, household objects and scenery. It comes from the two root words ami, meaning crocheted or knitted, and nuigurumi which means stuffed doll.

Glenda Poulter, a Community Sewing Volunteer since 2016, is celebrating 5 years as a WakeMed volunteer this quarter and has donated nearly 2,500 hours of service. Glenda has been crocheting since the age of nine. She loves to crochet, and it became a passion when she was diagnosed with cancer. Glenda began with crocheting hats for cancer patients. This launched her work into making comfort items. She crochets baby hats, shawls, and blankets.
