The President's Report



Thank you for continuing to volunteer your time with WakeMed. To those who are back on campus, welcome back! In this unusual time, many of us continue to be away from the hospital on a regular basis. I encourage you to continue to look for ways to care for those around you by offering encouraging words, sending a card or through practical help when possible. Also, remember to tend to your health – WakeMed Physician Practices and WakeMed Urgent Care both offer both in person and virtual visits, so please don't delay seeking care when you need it.

Since our last newsletter, we have had two fundraisers. The Masquerade Jewelry sale, which took place online, brought \$422 in contributions and the Macy's instore sale brought \$6,768 in contributions.

Thank you to the Volunteer Services staff and volunteers who worked the Macy's sale.

We continue to review grant requests as we receive them. Susan Legatowicz has done a great job shepherding the Finance Committee during this pandemic and I want to thank her for continued service to WakeMed. Since October, the beginning of our fiscal year, we are pleased to have approved these grants for this fiscal year for programs that we also supported last year:

Case Management 4B/4C – Provided \$2,800 in funds for the purchase of diapers, wipes, clothes and blankets for families with socio-economic need who give birth here at Wake-Med Raleigh this year. This supplements a clothing drive conducted by the staff each year and is of great benefit to our families.

HealthWorks Supervised Exercise Programs – Provided \$2,064 for twelve scholarships to the Safeway 2 Fitness, Transitional Exercise and Personal Training Plus programs. These scholarships are in support of WakeMed's Healthy Community & Culture of Safety aspirational goals and will also benefit those who need support as they improve their health.

As you work around the hospital and see or hear of needs that we may be able to meet through our grant program, please encourage staff to apply for funds. Information about the process is available through their employee portal or by contacting the Volunteer Services office.

I am hopeful for the health of our nation as we turn the corner into the new year – the vaccine brings a lot of promise. But, please remember to take care of yourselves and to follow the "Three W's" – wash your hands, wear a mask, and wait from each other 6 ft. apart.

The President's Report



Greetings on behalf of The Volunteers at WakeMed Cary Hospital board. In person volunteer activities remain suspended due to our public health situation except for some of the non-patient facing placement areas that have been deemed safe. With the curtailment of in person events, new ways to accomplish our goals have been implemented. The board hosted their October meeting within safety guidelines with some members in person and others virtual. Meetings were not held in November or December. Most of the vendor sales that raise funds to support volunteer projects such as medications for patients unable to purchase them, supplies for our community volunteers, the WakeMed Foundation, and purchases of furniture or equipment for various departments were moved online. Revenue was generated by the 1st Uniform and Masquerade Jewelry online sales as well as an in-store Belk's sale

with purchase pickup at the hospital. A successful Macy's Sale took place in their Crabtree Valley store on December 20 with the Cary volunteers receiving \$4,512. Thank you to the Volunteer Services staff and volunteers that supported these sales. The Threads Committee December Pop-Up Sale of handmade items was canceled. We appreciate the awesome donations from our in-house and community volunteers and look forward to rescheduling a bigger and better event.

Construction of Floors 4 and 5 West is continuing with the anticipated opening in the spring. Volunteers that walk throughout the hospital will have new areas to explore and service.

The Volunteer Department continues to accept handmade items. The Threads Committee has been tracking, sorting, and distributing care items to patient unit storage locations for care staff to give to patients. Items include mask extensions, afghans, wraps, shawls, blankets, quilts, baby hats, pillows, and huggable animals. If you or your family and friends have time and a talent to share, please contact the volunteer office staff. The Threads Committee continues to communicate with our community individuals and groups. A Threads newsletter was distributed in October that featured The Holly Springs Newcomers Group, a WakeMed volunteer partner, and our masked volunteers with filled carts headed out to stock storage areas.

Our Cary in-house and community volunteers contributed 15,466 hours during the first quarter of this fiscal year (Oct – Dec). These hours document significant volunteer support for our patients and staff during unprecedented and challenging times.

In mid-December, the Cary volunteers, under the leadership of Laura Riach, collected new, unwrapped toys for the Children's Hospital patients. We are so thankful for the caring individuals in our community that responded overwhelmingly to fill the office with gifts and brighten the lives of children.

As a challenging 2020 ends, I am grateful for our extraordinary WakeMed volunteers, volunteer boards, and Volunteer Services staff. As 2021 begins, I anxiously await the time that we can safely return to assist the staff, patients, and their families and resume on-site board activities. Thank you to the Volunteer Services staff for their continuing support. Also, thank you to the volunteers that have made handmade items, returned to fill placement areas, and kept board activities moving forward.

Cary Volunteer Spotlight

A big WakeMed THANK YOU to Cary Volunteer Charlie Davis. Recently, Charlie inspired a WakeMed Cardiac Rehab patient, who worked with Charlie every Friday morning, to bestow a gift to WakeMed in his honor. The family is grateful for Charlie's companionship and mentorship during a challenging time in their lives. Please read a little bit about how Charlie came to be a WakeMed Volunteer.

After heart surgery a couple of years ago at WakeMed I was prescribed cardiac rehab by my cardiologist. I was very apprehensive in moving forward with the prescribed program as I never formally exercised a day in my life. Between the program director as well as one of the nurses and a volunteer at the rehab center they talked me into trying the program.

During my 36 sessions at Cary Cardiac Rehab I was aided by nurses and staff as well as Cardiac Rehab volunteers. The rehab program made a difference in my attitude towards exercise as well as how to eat healthy and understand what has happened to my body. I started enjoying seeing myself, as well as others, change dramatically in how they approached their health and how they physically improved.

As I approached the end of my rehab sessions, I realized that there were many folks that helped me achieve my goals. The staff at Cary Rehab, the doctors that volunteered their time daily to support the rehab staff and of course, the volunteers. The WakeMed Cardiac Rehab program has many moving parts all gracefully choreographed by their staff and volunteers. Graduation from the program was bittersweet; however, I was going to follow through with the Safeway to Fitness program so I would still see those that made a difference in my life. What could I do to help them?

A few weeks after graduation an opening in the program presented itself to me. One of the pre-requisites to volunteer was to have gone through the WakeMed Cardiac Rehab program. Well that is one check mark off the list of many requirements. After various training sessions I became an active volunteer. This has become one of the most important things I have ever done as I feel valued by the rehab staff as well as those attending the rehab sessions. It has been a wonderful opportunity to be able to give back to those that helped me, and I will continue to do so until I am unable.



Project Linus is a National Organization with chapters across the United States. Our local Wake County chapter donates thousands of blankets each year. Project Linus Community Sewers create beautiful afghans and quilts for our patients. Every volunteer is doing what they love, and we never know how each life is touched.

The following is a note from a Mother of a WakeMed patient:

Dear Project Linus,

In December 2005, my five month old son was in the Emergency Room at Wake Med getting a CAT scan which showed he had hydrocephalus and needed emergency surgery to correct it.

I had never heard of Project Linus until a lady walked up to me and said, "I have been waiting all day for the right person to give this to," and she handed me a small quilt. In the midst of a scary, confusing moment for me, the gift of that blanket brought me back to Earth and gave me the strength to move forward for my son.

I was impressed with the gift at that time. But, never in a million years did I think I would again be touched by Project Linus in the darkest moments of my life.

On August 25, 2020, we removed life support from my oldest son who was 17 and had suffered an accidental overdose. When we arrived that day he was covered in a crocheted blanket, sized just right for an older child. ~

I did not meet the angel who brought the blanket which covered him in his last moments and which gave me something to take home, to hold when I could no longer hold my son.

Neither of my children were conscious of receiving their blankets. But I want you to know they mean just as much, if not more, to the mothers and fathers as I am sure they do to the children who receive them.

I still have both blankets, and I will keep them forever.

Please accept this donation in the name of my eldest son, Cameron Glen. I am including a picture so you know the lives you touch are real and to put a face to those whom you help.

I would also like to thank Edrina, a close friend who has done quilts for Project Linus in the past and may be doing one in Cameron's memory sometime soon. She is one of the angels who are touching lives through your organization.


