### **Hospitality Pets Article Shared**

The next time you have an extended stay in a hospital, you might be able to see your own pet dog to help you feel better. Hospitals are cautiously beginning to allow family members to bring pets from home to see patients.

At WakeMed Health & Hospitals, for example, long term patients who are healthy enough may visit a pet as long as the pet is cleared by hospital staff; the visit is only allowed in certain areas.

Of course, there are infection concerns, which is why hospitals are treading lightly, but there is little doubt in the power of a healing paw. WakeMed has had a form of a hospitality pets program since 1987 after an injured man in rehab responded amazingly well after visiting with a dog, says Marie Johnson, Manager of Volunteer Services at WakeMed's Raleigh Campus. That program now has 50 dogs across WakeMed's campuses that make 6,000 annual visits.

These dogs are specially trained and screened medically and are not the household pets allowed to visit on special occasion.

Although the N.C. Hospital Association doesn't track or advise on pet programs, spokesman Don Dalton says "pet therapy is becoming more popular," and that he is "confident more hospitals are going in that direction."

Various area hospitals have policies for therapy animals, or even for household pets to visit.

## Duke Children's and WakeMed Children's Specialty Services

On Monday, July 15, Duke Children's and WakeMed Children's Specialty Services will open in Suite 200 of the Raleigh Medical Park, located across from the Raleigh Campus at 23 Sunnybrook Road.

The new outpatient pediatric specialty center is a collaboration between Duke Medicine and WakeMed to promote the health of children and adolescents in Wake County and the surrounding communities. The center will bring additional pediatric specialties to the Raleigh Campus.

"Clustering Duke pediatric specialists and subspecialists with WakeMed pediatric specialists near WakeMed Children's Hospital will make it more convenient for patients to access a broad array of specialty care in one location," commented Dr. Bill Atkinson, WakeMed President and CEO.

The center will offer a wide variety of services including allergy/immunology, cardiology, endocrinology, gastroenterology, hematology, infectious diseases, medical genetics, nephrology, neurology, neurosurgery, pediatric surgery, pulmonary and sleep medicine, rheumatology, and urology.

As part of this collaborative, the WakeMed Children's Diabetes & Endocrinology Clinic located at 2610 New Bern Avenue and Wake Specialty Physicians Pediatric Surgery located at 3024 New Bern Avenue are moving from their current locations to the new specialty center at the Raleigh Medical Park. The Duke services offered at this new location are being relocated from the Duke Children's Consultative Services now based at 3480 Wake Forest Road on the Duke Raleigh Hospital campus.
