## **The President's Report**



**Greetings Volunteers!** 

Even though summer is generally a time for vacations and relaxation, your Volunteer Board continues to work hard, seeking ways in which we can be of more help to those who enter the doors of WakeMed. Our main focus is fundraising through the sales that are held several times a year. Many times at our board meetings, we have requests for funds that really pull at our heartstrings. I would like to take this opportunity to highlight a couple of these, involving our tiniest patients and their families in the NICU.

In order to support these families, some of whom are in the NICU for a long time, meals are served twice a month and sometimes meaningful crafts made in the parent lounge. The board has given funds to feed these families with a delicious meal and give them a smile through a craft. This enables the parents to gather and share their progress and celebrations. Usually, a NICU graduate parent will come to help encourage them and answer their questions. For Mother's Day, footprints of each baby were stamped in the shape of a heart to remember their NICU Mother's Day. We find it so important to take what we can off the parent's shoulders, so they can have room and time to process their journey. The meals have a huge impact on our families.

Another way that we help the NICU is with a Bereavement fund. This provides parents with hand painted bereavement boxes when they lose a baby. Inside is included anything that had touched the baby (blood pressure cuffs, leads, clothes, blanket, etc,). Other materials like photos, a small frame, a candle and cloth that have been with the baby to capture its smell may be included.

The WakeMed Raleigh and Cary Boards had the special opportunity to tour our Milk Bank in Cary. This is only one of 25 in the country, and the only one in North Carolina. Our tiny patients in the NICU at WakeMed and several other states are the beneficiaries of this gift of breast milk donated by mother's who have extra milk. It is amazing to hear of the careful screening, processing and pasteurising that goes into the best nutrition a baby can have. We will most likely be helping to fund a special pump in the near future, saving the workers heavy lifting and pouring of large beakers.

I would encourage any volunteers who have not assisted at one of our fundraiser sales, to come and join us. To those who help, thank you so much for making a difference in so many lives!


## **Volunteer Services Updates**
