THE GARNER HEALTHPLEX CELEBRATES 10 YEARS of caring for our community this month. The facility opened on August 19, 2013, and has cared for more than 326,000 patients in the past decade. While Garner Healthplex is currently our 'youngest' standalone emergency department, it is also our busiest. In addition to an Emergency Department, the facility includes outpatient imaging and lab services and several physician practices: ENT – Head & Neck Surgery, Cardiology, Primary Care, Wake Orthopaedics and Urology. The site has been home to several innovations in care, including a pilot telemedicine program with WakeMed Hospital Medicine providers to expedite care for patients awaiting bed placement. WakeMed's presence in Garner is set to grow in the coming years with our plans to build a whole-person health campus that will include a 150-bed mental health hospital and a 45-bed acute care hospital, pending final CON approval from the NC Department of Health and Human Services.

To support the health and well-being of all members of our community, WakeMed has installed several drug take-back bins at our facilities. Safely disposing of unused or expired drugs is important so that they don't become a safety hazard.

The bins are located in the following areas:

- > Raleigh Campus 1E Visitor's lobby, ground floor
- > Cary Hospital Main lobby
- > North Hospital Main lobby, near Gift Shop



A fourth bin will be installed in the Medical Park of Cary in the coming months.

For safety, the bins are all placed in highly public and monitored areas of the hospitals. All medications dropped in the take-back bins at WakeMed will be destroyed and discarded. Deposits are completely anonymous and no records are kept of drop offs.

The first bin was installed at Cary Hospital in the spring of 2022 and has already helped safely dispose of 700+ pounds of medications. Some of this volume is likely driven by patients receiving pain management services in the Medical Day Treatment Unit, as it offers a very convenient place to dispose of medications they no longer need.

"Medication take-back bins are the safest, most effective way to dispose of prescription or over-the-counter medications," explains **Abbie Williamson**, PharmD, executive director (Pharmacy). "Emergency Department visits related to accidental ingestion of

medications continue to rise. We hope that having these bins available in our facilities will make it easy for our patients, their families and our staff to dispose of medications they no longer need, and keep others safe."

DRUG TAKE-BACK BIN GUIDELINES



The following items can be deposited in the WakeMed Drug Take-Back bins:

- > Unused and prescription medications
- > Unused and expired over-the-counter medications
- > Pet medication
- Vitamins

Please note: Providers and staff are welcome to dispose of unused or expired medication in their possession but cannot dispose of medication on behalf of patients.



The following items should NOT be deposited in the WakeMed Drug Take-Back bins:

- > Illegal drugs
- > Thermometers
- Inhalers
- > Lotions or liquids
- Aerosol cans
- > Needles and sharps
- > Hydrogen peroxide



WakeMed Recognized for Social Responsibility

WakeMed, Raleigh Campus (including North Hospital) and Cary Hospital have all been named to the 2023 Hospital Index for Social Responsibility, published by the Lown Institute, a nonpartisan health care think tank. Building Relationships & Supporting Recovery

Rehab Peer Support Program Builds Connections to Strengthen the Recovery Journey

Helping patients realize the best possible functional outcomes is one of the primary goals of the WakeMed Rehabilitation team. "Recovery from a life-altering health condition or injury can be a long process. Being able to connect with someone who can relate can be a springboard to a more timely and healthy adjustment," commented **Beth Villena**, director (WakeMed Rehab Hospital). "Knowing that there is productive and satisfying life after illness or injury gives patients hope to push through the early days."



That's where the WakeMed Rehabilitation Peer Support program can make such a difference. Research shows that patients who are actively engaged in their care have better outcomes, and peer support can be an excellent complement to more formalized services available in a rehabilitation environment. With both group and individual support options, WakeMed's Peer Support program helps patients more actively engage in their rehab program and kick-starts their journey back to normal life.

In recent years the face-to-face component of the program was paused due to COVID-19-related visitation restrictions. Over the past year Rehab Hospital leadership has committed to rebuilding the program across all specialty areas (Stroke, Brain Injury, Amputee and Spinal Cord Injury) with a goal of streamlining and improving the process for prospective peer supporters and more effectively connecting patients interested in the

To support these goals, a dedicated peer support volunteer program coordinator was established, and retired WakeMed employee **Skip Roy** took on this volunteer position. The coordinator serves as a liaison between Volunteer Services, Rehab leadership and the volunteer peer supporters. The coordinator helps with onboarding peer supporters, provides ongoing support for the program and helps connect supporters and patients.

WakeMed leaders also established standard processes associated with identifying patients who might want to participate in the program and matching them with the most appropriate peer supporter. Most peer supporters are available each week for patient visits, which are placed on the patient's schedule to ensure that no other activities interfere. If a connection is made during the first visit, patients and peer supporters are empowered to exchange contact information or schedule additional visits.

To continue enhancing the program, WakeMed Rehab will offer ongoing education for peer supporters on topics such as stages of grief, active listening and more. "The connections that are fostered as part of the Peer Support program are truly remarkable and make a real impact on patient engagement in recovery," commented **Jeanne Dibbert**, manager (Rehab Case Management) who helps coordinate the program. "This is a great example of how WakeMed puts patients and families at the forefront in all we do."

After many months of planning, education and transition, the Raleigh Campus "Realignment Relay" is now complete!

Staff at Raleigh Campus have demonstrated their Wake Way spirit in new ways by supporting one another during this period of change, which directly impacted nine units on four floors (either in moving locations, changing patient populations or opening/ closing). A team of 120 stakeholders met every other week for several months to keep the project moving forward and plan for each phase. Thank you to everyone who was involved in this project – directly or indirectly – for your incredible support and engagement.

Neuro Intermediate Care team joined hospital and nursing leadership on the 'starting line' days before they began welcoming patients back to their newly renovated unit. On June 6, the Capacity & Transfer Management Center officially 'passed the torch' to 5B when they assigned the first patients to the unit, officially marking the

Following 5B's reopening, the torch was passed to 3E, 3B and 6A. Throughout June, the three units shifted patients and staff between them, and into 1B Clinical Evaluation Area, to better align services and match available beds to patient needs.

When the moves in the Acute Care and Heart & Vascular units were complete, the Critical Care teams were ready to jump into the relay. Cardiothoracic Surgery Intensive Care and Neuro Intensive Care moved into new spaces on 2E and STICU and MICU expanded their footprints within the current ICU spaces.

While the total number of open ICU beds did not change, the current layout better aligns our physical space and staff to serve our patients.



NORTH HOSPITAL EXPANDS IMAGING SERVICES

As North Hospital continues to grow to serve the needs of our community, Imaging Services recently introduced new diagnostic services and added several pieces of state-of-the-art equipment. The first diagnostic procedure, Light Interventional Radiology, is performed in a procedure room and provides patients access to two studies: paracentesis (fluid removal from the abdomen for analysis and/or pressure relief) and thoracentesis (removal of excess fluid or air from the chest). The second, Transesophageal Echo (TEE), is specifically for cardiac patients. Three weekly scheduled time slots are available for patients in need of this service.

Additionally, through our *Value Partnership* with Siemens Healthineers, North Hospital has added a brand-new Agile Max fluoroscopy and radiography room to perform speech modification studies, which supports our stroke program and speech therapists. This new service is in addition to providing full fluoroscopy services. Additional equipment enhancements include a Siemens Ysio Max, a general radiology room and Siemens Sequoia ultrasound units. These advanced systems allow WakeMed to offer the best imaging services, with lower doses of radiation, more efficient workflows, improved imaging quality and less time for patients.

North Hospital has utilized a mobile MRI unit for many years and this summer we submitted a certificate of need (CON) application to add a fixed MRI to the facility, which would accommodate expanded procedure capabilities, reduce transfers, support the needs of ICU patients and increase in patient acuity. A decision on the CON application is expected by November 30. All imaging modalities provided at WakeMed (diagnostic imaging, CT, MRI, mammography and ultrasound) are accredited by the American College of Radiology.

Exceptional Care for an Exceptional Population

Caring for older patients often requires additional support and planning – particularly in an emergency department setting. The Cary Hospital Emergency Department (ED) team understands this well: in 2022, nearly a third of the 45,000 patients they cared for were 65 or older, and, therefore, considered geriatric patients. Given this high volume of older patients, the Cary ED has made this – often fragile and especially vulnerable – population a priority.

"We recognize that older patients often face different challenges – whether physically, mentally or emotionally. As a team, we have been able to truly elevate the level of care we provide and what we can do to support our patients," explains **Amy Short**, RN, director (Emergency Services – Cary Hospital).

Some of the changes – like installing clocks that are easier to read – have been simple, while others – adjustments to pain management protocols – are much more complex. A few of the programs they have implemented include:

- Minimizing inappropriate or harmful medication use while ensuring adequate pain control.
- Introducing targeted screenings related to delirium, dementia, functional decline and abuse.
- > Improving access to food and drink, which helps patients maintain their strength.
- > Changes to the physical space, including low beds, more handrails, limited noise and enhanced lighting.
- > Creating an interdisciplinary geriatric assessment team

This work has been led by an interdisciplinary team of providers, nurses, clinical support staff, rehab staff, Pharmacy, Case Management, Information Services, Spiritual Care and others. The Volunteers at Cary Hospital provided funds for large-face clocks, four-pronged canes (as an alternative to walkers) and

not have access to their hearing aids. The team also received a WakeMed Foundation Grant to support 15 nurses taking a Geriatric Emergency Nursing Education course.

With all these programs in place, the Cary ED hopes to add another entry to its list of certifications recognizing high-quality care – along with Level III Trauma, Chest Pain Center and Primary Stroke Center. The department recently applied for accreditation as a Geriatric

Emergency Department from the American College of Emergency Physicians. As of late July, they were awaiting word of a site visit, which is the next step in receiving this certification.
