WakeMed has been named a 2023 Leader in Diversity by the Triangle Business Journal. This is the sixth time WakeMed received this award, which recognizes the accomplishments of Triangle businesses, individuals and nonprofits as they work to weave a diverse foundational fabric into the heart of the local community. WakeMed was one of 10 organizations and 13 individuals to be recognized this year.

Inclusion, respect and equality have always been central to WakeMed's values and our mission of caring for all people, serving the underserved and advocating for those who have no advocate. Today, WakeMed supports an active, staff-led Diversity & Inclusion Council, honors members of the armed forces, celebrates Diversity & Inclusion Awareness month, provides services for multiple faith traditions and offers ongoing educational opportunities. WakeMed is also involved in numerous community partnerships, the Raleigh Chamber/Triangle Diversity & Inclusion task force, the "52 Shades of Success" series, and numerous events that celebrate our diverse community.

Leaders from Duke Health, WakeMed and Lifepoint Health gathered in late September for a ceremonial groundbreaking on a new inpatient rehabilitation hospital in Apex, NC. Peak Rehabilitation Hospital is a tri-venture among the three organizations and will open in late 2024.

The 62,000-square-foot facility will function as a stand-alone hospital with 52 beds, all private rooms. and feature multidisciplinary therapy gymnasiums outfitted with the latest therapeutic technologies, outdoor courtyards and other spaces designed to help patients return to activities of daily living. The facility will be structurally designed to meet the needs of patients receiving acute inpatient rehabilitation care for stroke, amputation and other injuries and disorders.

"Duke Health and WakeMed represent the best in health and healing, and we have long discussed ways to expand access to high-quality inpatient rehab care by utilizing our combined expertise and resources to help patients recover and rejoin the community after a serious illness or injury," said Donald Gintzig, WakeMed president & CEO.

Health Equity Curriculum Launches

NEW PROGRAM FOCUSES ON UNDERSTANDING, ADDRESSING HEALTH EQUITIES IN WAKE COUNTY



This month, WakeMed launched a new, health equity program focusing on racial equity and historically marginalized groups. The Health Equity curriculum is intended to shine a light on the health inequities that impact our community and provide opportunities for participants to work together to identify strategies to address them.

Two cohorts will take part in the pilot program, which utilizes a customized curriculum titled "Beyond Our Walls." The cohorts include physicians, APPs, and clinical and

nonclinical staff throughout our system. During the 12-month program, the 40 participants will go through a journey of gaining knowledge to taking action to close the gap on health disparities in our community. In the future, trained health equity scholars will lead subsequent cohorts through the curriculum and assist in the sustainability of this health equity work, expanding the reach of this important educational resource.

"WakeMed has always taken pride in providing excellent care to each and every patient.

Health care and our community have changed dramatically in the last 60 years - and the disparities in access to care and health outcomes for marginalized patient populations only continue to grow," explains Theresa Amerson, MD, chief medical officer, Population Health. "The Health Equity Scholars program is one example of how WakeMed is

WAKEMED FOUNDATION

For almost 30 years, the WakeMed Foundation has been committed to investing in the people and services of WakeMed to build healing environments, support innovation and growing the skills of our caregivers. The mission of the WakeMed Foundation is to be the philanthropic partner of WakeMed and – with the help of generous donors – support the health and well-being of our community. The WakeMed Foundation recently announced the recipients of their large awards for 2023. These awards touch nearly every service line and every facility across the WakeMed system and represent an investment of more than \$6 million. Here is a brief overview of some of the programs being made possible with the philanthropic support of the WakeMed Foundation.

In addition to these programs, the Foundation also recently awarded the hospital system \$200,000 for continued education support as well as urgent and emergent needs. A new process for funding allocation is being developed, with more information to come in the coming months.

GROWING SKILLED CAREGIVERS

NEW FUNDING INITIATIVES

> Virtual Inpatient Nursing: Virtual inpatient nursing provides support, guidance and mentoring to help novice nurses meet the complex and dynamic needs of hospitalized patients. The program will allow staff, providers, patients and families to engage in real-time, two-way audio and video communications at the patient's bedside. Foundation funding will

be used to purchase software and equipment to support the introduction of this program in select units across the system.

CONTINUED FUNDING INITIATIVES

- > Educational Assistance: Support for a wide variety of educational opportunities including the Helton Scholars, Helton Awardees, the Megan Champ Morgan Scholarship Fund and other programs.
- Diversity Training and Health Equity Curriculum: An ongoing, comprehensive education and action series for leaders and front-line clinicians (see article above).
- Clinical Innovators & Investigators: Funding will be used to foster and support research efforts across the system.

FOSTERING INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS

NEW FUNDING INITIATIVES

- > Streamlined Health Record Access: Compiling a comprehensive and accurate record of a patient's medical history, including services obtained outside of WakeMed, is incredibly challenging. This funding will support implementation of the Bamboo Health platform, which utilizes a robust nationwide network of electronic health record systems to provide a more comprehensive view of patient medical history and engagement.
- > Cancer Care Support: As our Cancer Care offerings grow, so do the needs of our patients. Funding will support comfort services for patients receiving outpatient cancer care, as well as mammogram outreach for uninsured community members.

CONTINUED FUNDING INITIATIVES

- > Community Health Initiatives: WakeMed continues to expand access and patient well-being through the Your Whole Health social determinants of health screening program, patient assistance programs (travel vouchers, prescription assistance, NARCAN take-home kits and much more), Spiritual Care services at the Center for Community Health and other programs.
- > Patient Engagement: Continued support for software that supports two-way communication with patients and puts access to their health care in the palm of their hand.
- > Tobacco Cessation Program: Ongoing funding for Quit With WakeMed, which supports patients on their journey to quit tobacco.

BUILDING HEALING ENVIRONMENTS

NEW FUNDING INITIATIVES

> Cary NICU Renovations: The Cary Hospital Neonatal Intensive Care Unit is the only one in the system with open bays. Funding will be used to support renovations and the conversion of the unit to private rooms, which will enhance the family experience.

CONTINUED FUNDING INITIATIVES

- > Mobile Mammography Service: Support to upfit a mobile mammography unit, which will enable WakeMed to improve convenience and access to this life-saving screening across the community.
- > Mobile Nuclear Medicine Unit: Adding a Mobile Nuclear Medicine unit will enable WakeMed to bring evaluation of cardiac blood flow and organ function to convenient locations.

The Foundation has also provided funds to specific service lines and departments that can be allocated in support of patient needs, employee education, innovations or innovative equipment purchases. These areas include WakeMed Rehabilitation, WakeMed Children's, Spiritual Care and Mental Health & Well-Being.

How Funding Is Allocated

Funding requests are submitted by unit/department leadership and are reviewed by WakeMed's executive leadership team and the WakeMed Foundation Board of Directors. Projects must align with the system's goals and priorities to be considered.

For 2024, the Large Award Request for Proposals (RFP) window runs from December 1, 2023, through February 1, 2024. Proposals selected for further consideration will be required to submit a full A3 by March 15, 2024. Stacy Wilson Receives National Recognition



The National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy, Inc. (NBCOT®) has awarded **Stacy Wilson**, OT, manager, (Acute Rehab Services – Cary Hospital & North Hospital) a 2023 NBCOT Impact Award. Wilson is

one of four individuals in the country to receive this award, which recognizes occupational therapy practitioners who demonstrate exceptional professional commitment through dedication, hard work, and outstanding OT skills.

Wilson was recognized for his work in advancing inclusive and equitable care for all people, populations and communities. A member of the WakeMed Diversity & Inclusion Council, Wilson has spent his career creating opportunities to make occupational therapy more accessible for individuals from marginalized backgrounds. Wilson is a cofounder of the nonprofit Coalition of Occupational Therapy Advocates for Diversity (COTAD), and an online forum now called the Black-Male Registered Occupational Therapy Healthcare Professionals Assistants and Students (B.R.O.T.H.A.S.), which provides a platform for Black male occupational practitioners and students to connect. Wilson also developed the Increasing Diversity in Occupational Therapy Scholarship at UNC-Chapel Hill, which provides financial support to students who commit to spreading awareness of the OT field to underrepresented groups and has coauthored several publications related to diversity and inclusion.

Garner Healthplex CT Named Lung Cancer Screening Center

Garner Healthplex CT services has been recognized as a Lung Cancer Screening Center by the American College of Radiology (ACR). Garner Healthplex is the first facility in our system to receive this designation.

The ACR Lung Cancer Screening Center designation is a voluntary program that recognizes facilities for their commitment to practice safe, effective diagnostic care for individuals at the highest risk for lung cancer. Receiving this designation signifies that a facility provides valuable screening services to the community at the highest standards.



In order to receive this elite distinction, facilities must be accredited by the ACR in CT in the chest module and undergo a rigorous assessment of its lung cancer screening protocol and infrastructure. Procedures must also be in place for follow-up patient care, such as counseling and smoking cessation programs.





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
